<b>Subject Title</b>	Research Seminars in Logistics I / II / III / IV

<b>Normal Duration</b>	1 academic year (two 13-week semesters and one 7-week term)
<b>Pre-requisite / Co-requisite/ Exclusion</b>	Nil
<b>Role and Purposes</b>	This is a series of seminars conducted by academic staff and guest speakers. They focus on research issues in logistics and cover such topics as review of literature, model building, research methodologies, analysis and reporting of research findings. This subject will expose research students to current issues of research and development in logistics, and provide them with opportunities to interact directly with the speakers.
<b>Subject Learning Outcomes</b>	Upon completion of the subject, students will be able to: a. Understand the ‘cutting edge’ topics and literature within the fields of logistics and maritime studies; b. Integrate theories and practices; c. Demonstrate an ability to critique research methodologies and findings within the logistics and maritime studies literature.
<b>Subject Synopsis/ Indicative Syllabus</b>	The focus will be on current research directions in the following areas: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>▪ Maritime Policy and Management</li><li>▪ Maritime Law</li><li>▪ Transportation Economics and Management</li><li>▪ Operations Research/Management Science</li></ul>
<b>Teaching/Learning Methodology</b>	Student participation, discussions and interactions with the speakers will be strongly encouraged during the seminars.

	<p>Explanation of the appropriateness of the assessment methods in assessing the intended learning outcomes:</p> <p>All students are required to attend at least 10 research seminars per academic year, in addition to workshops/ conferences, and to submit a report to the Chief Supervisor of no less than 1,500 words (excluding references) on one of the attended seminars every academic year. The research seminars may or may not be organized by the host department and are expected to last not less than an hour each. The topic of the seminar reported on should not be related directly to the thesis title of the student.</p> <p>Students are recommended to complete one credit per year for completing the requirement, with an overall assessment grade of Pass and Fail. However, as deemed appropriate by the Chief Supervisor, they will be allowed to complete at most two credits per year to fulfill the research seminar credit requirement.</p> <p>The total credits to be earned by the 3-year PhD students will be three credits and the 4-year students four credits. Two credits are required for the MPhil exit award.</p>
